# **Action Items**

- HEAD START/EARLY HEAD START REPORT: The Board approved the Head Start/Early Head Start monthly fiscal and operational reports on MOTION by Trustee Mittleider. Affirmative vote was unanimous.
- 2. Vice President of Finance and Administration Jeff Harmon asked for approval to transfer \$325,000 of donated funds, to the College of Southern Idaho's Foundation for the use of construction and development of a grazing lab, livestock housing containment and handling facility as well as various equipment to be located on the Foundations Breckenridge Endowment Farm. The Board approved the transfer as presented on MOTION by Trustee Nelsen. Affirmative vote was unanimous.
- 3. Per Idaho Statute, the 2022 Trustee election results for Trustee Scholes and Trustee McClure were accepted as written on MOTION by Chairman Stone. Affirmative vote was unanimous.

## **Information Items**

- Vice President for Student Life and Enrollment Services Dr. Jonathan Lord presented a summary of the College's Strategic Enrollment Management and Retention Plan. CSI's core mission is to support the instructional and training needs of the Magic Valley and our SEM Plan is aligned with our mission and interwoven with our CSI Strategic Plan.
- Trustee Mittleider shared a report from a recent conference she attended for the
  Association of Community College Trustees. She emphasized the ongoing professional
  development for the Trustees to remain current on what's working well in community
  colleges.
- 3. Interim Director of CSI's Office on Aging Sharon Underwood provided a report. She discussed the challenges face by her office in providing services as the needs of individuals outpace available funding, largely due to inflation.
- 4. CSI Campus Safety Director Keith Thompson provided an update on the current operations. He emphasized ongoing work being done to improve emergency procedures and to support additional training.
- 5. Chairman Stone led the trustees in congratulating inaugural recipients of Maxine Bell Education Advocate Award. Idaho Commission on Hispanic Affairs Executive Director Margie Gonzales and retired Jerome Public Schools educator Linda Burton were both in attendance to accept the award.

<u>CSI STUDENT BODY PRESIDENT REPORT:</u> Student Body President Aurora Berumen Ortiz provided her monthly report.





#### **Program Report**

On November 18<sup>th</sup>, the program received the Notice of Award for half of the 2023 program year funds. This is the usual process; the program receives half at the beginning of the grant cycle and the other half typically before May. The Notice of Award is attached for your review.

November's attendance was significantly lower, HS 78% and EHS 72%, than average. RSV has hit Southern Idaho early and hard. The Twin Falls center was closed for 2 days November 17<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup> because more than 50% of the children were out sick. Twin Falls Center staff cleaned and disinfected classrooms and equipment before the Fall break.

The first three months of the program year staff are busy collecting baseline scores and data for all components of the program; Education, Family Services, and Health. Performance Standards require this information to be shared with the Board of Trustee's and Policy Council. This months Board Report consists of a significant amount of data.

## **FAMILY SERVICES**

The Family Outcomes Assessment analyze weaknesses within the family unit and connects families with resources and education to strengthen those weaknesses and encourage family autonomy. Patterns that show areas where families are in urgent need of intervention can be identified and supported at the program level.

The family assessment is completed twice in a program year for Head Start and three times a year for Early Head Start. Prior to assessing families, families are informed of the assessment tool and its purpose. Assessment results are reviewed with each family after each completion and used to create a Family Partnership Agreement goal.

#### **Head Start:**

- o Family's first assessment is due within the first 45 days after enrollment.
- o Family's second assessment is due by 180 days after initial assessment unless the family already had an assessment less than 30 days prior to that date.

Re: Transfer of Funds to the College of Southern Idaho Foundation

We are very careful concerning the separation between the College and the College of Southern Idaho Foundation. Except for a few checks written to the College in error, we do not write, transfer, or endorse checks made out to the College without the permission of the Board of Trustees.

The College of Southern Idaho received a donation of \$325,000 from a donor with the intent that the funds would be used for the Construction and Development of a Grazing Lab, Construction of Livestock Housing Containment and Handling Facility plus various equipment to be located on the Foundations Breckenridge Endowment Farm. These funds were deposited in the general account of the college. Erica Allen Executive Director of the CSI Foundation as well as the CSI Foundation finance committee are aware of the transaction

I respectfully request that the Board authorize me to write a check and transfer \$325,000 to the College of Southern Idaho Foundation to be deposited into the Foundations account dedicated for this project.

# Motion:

I move to allow Vice President Harmon to transfer \$325,000 of doner funds to the College of Southern Idaho Foundation for this specific project on the Foundations Breckenridge Endowment Farm.

# Statement of Gift

An annual restricted gift (referred to as the "Gift") is given by the mutual consent of Northwest Farm Credit Services (referred to as "Donor") and the College of Southern Idaho (referred to as "College"). It is intended that the Gift be expendable on a current basis for the uses, benefits and purposes of the CSI Agriculture Department, as more fully described below.

#### **Background**

Northwest Farm Credit Services is dedicated to improving the lives of its customers, employees, and the communities and industries it serves. As such, the donor is investing \$325,000 to be used to support the construction of a small animal grazing laboratory and purchase of associated equipment to operate the facility. The lab will be operated to provide instructional opportunities for students in the CSI Agriculture Department and will be located on the CSI Breckenridge Endowment Farm.

#### **Uses and Purposes**

The Gift is designated to the CSI Agriculture Department to advance educational opportunities for students and support hands-on experiential learning. Examples of how the funds will be used include:

## Construction and Development of Grazing Lab

#### **Estimated Costs:**

# Construction of Livestock Housing/Containment/Handling facilities

Facilities will include a fully-fenced area approximately 115 ft. x 80 ft. subdivided into 2 containment areas (corrals) with approximately 75 linear feet of loafing sheds, and within the perimeter of this area, a non-insulated 60 ft. x 40 ft. steel animal handling building/animal teaching lab with concrete floor and equipped with solar lighting.

All expenditures of the Gift shall be used exclusively for the purposes of the College of Southern Idaho as so required and defined under federal tax law and applicable IRS regulations.

#### **Change of Conditions**

If, at some future date, circumstances should change so that the uses and purposes for which this Gift has been given no longer exist, are impossible or impractical, or are in conflict with the administration or academic policies of the College of Southern Idaho, then the Gift may be expended in a manner which then serves the best interests of the CSI Agriculture Department, bearing in mind the intentions of the donor.

This agreement constitutes the entire understanding between the parties pertaining to its subject matter and supersedes all prior agreements, discussions and understanding, both oral and written, of the parties relating to its subject matter.

The foregoing terms and provisions of the Gift are hereby acknowledged and accepted by Northwest Farm Credit Services and the College of Southern Idaho.


